THE HUNTER FAMILIES OF HISTORIC ALEXANDRIA, VIRGINIA

Under Federal rule, Alexandria would become the forgotten corner of the District. Between the losses of epidemics brought on by a fast-growing population, loss of ships to French and British privateers, and inland trade barriers, its new status so eagerly sought precipitated a reversal of fortune. Human trade, slavery, replaced the once burgeoning agricultural commerce. The impetus to petition for retrocession became critical in anticipation of the District's outlawing the leading industry of the day. The man who took up the cause was Robert Mercer Taliaferro Hunter (1809-1887).

R. M. T. HUNTER ... Probably one of the most well-known Hunter of Civil War years, Robert Hunter was a serious candidate for President of the United States losing the nomination to Stephen Douglas at the 1860 Democratic Convention. As a US Representative from 1837-43 and 1845-47, Hunter fought for Alexandria's retrocession, turning the tide in an eloquent speech to Congress in 1847. Elected to the Senate in 1852, he was expelled in 1861 prior to Virginia's secession. This freed him to hold significant sway as Secretary of State and Senator in the Confederate Provincial Congress during the Civil War. As one of the Southern Triumvirate, with Jefferson Davis and Robert Toombs, he was a believer in slavery, states' rights, and the South. You may recall a scene in the recent film, Lincoln, where the beleaguered President meets aboard the Steamship Monroe with peace commissioners from the Confederacy in what is known as the Hampton Roads Conference (1865). Hunter was one of those Confederate negotiators. He continued to serve the state of Virginia through Reconstruction.

WARRIORS...The Scottish were used to fighting for freedom, and this was perpetuated in the New World. In the Revolution (1775-1783), *A Pay Roll of Capt. Dennis Ramsay's Company of Militia*, dated 1777, lists the pay of Pvt. Jackson Hunter who received 4 pounds 13 and 4 for two months and 10 days' active duty. Pvt. Hunter served with other sons of prominent citizens whose job it was to protect people and landholdings.

In the Mexican-American War (1846-1848), two Hunters were listed *en route* to Mexico in January 1847, Robert Hunter, Jr., and Robert Hunter, Sr., They arrived too late to share in the glory of victory. April muster sheets show Zebediah. P. Hunter on the roster. Gen. John Hunter was believed to receive his rank in the Mexican-American War, but records no longer exist to support that.

The Civil War (1861-1865) – Enlisted in the Alexandria Riflemen, Company A, was Alexander Hunter, wounded at Manassas. In the Old Dominion Rifles, Company 11, were Private Charles. E. Hunter, accidently shot at Drury's Bluff; and in the 4th Cavalry, Alexander Hunter, probably the same Alexander who was wounded at Manassas. These were all sons of Dr. John Hunter.

JOHN HUNTER...As a port, Alexandria built and owned ships. The first shipyard was well-established by 1800 and flourished until its destruction by Union forces in the Civil War. It was owned by John Hunter and two subsequent generations of Hunters. The port's commercial presence was major. It was one of the ten largest in America, but by 1801, French and British privateers had picked off a substantial portion of the fleet. Today, a Heritage Trail marker commemorates Hunter's Shipyard between Wolfe and Wilkes Streets on the waterfront. There today the Alexandria Seaport Foundation operates a shop where at-risk youth apprentice as boat builders.

DR. JOHN HUNTER...Also between Wolfe and Wilkes lived the first doctor and founding citizen, Dr. John Hunter (c1721-1764). He came from Hunterston, Ayr around 1746. The generations of his family are well-documented in genealogical studies, and military and grave records. He does not appear to be directly related to John Hunter of the Shipyard or to William Hunter, Jr., the Mayor of Alexandria. His family formed a social circle with four or five other Colonial families—the Chapmans,

Tylers, Grays, and Tripletts, preferring to remain separate. Dr. Hunter married Elizabeth Chapman around 1751, and had children Navy Surgeon George Hunter (1753-1776), Gen. John Chapman Hunter (1755-1850), Amelia Hunter (1757-1811), Margaret Hunter, (1761-?), and Nathaniel Chapman Hunter. Several of his children and grandchildren have stories worth telling (1764-1812).

SONS...The boys grew up to serve their country. At sixteen, son John began service in the Continental Army and rose to the rank of General, probably in the War of 1812. Brother George served as surgeon in the Continental Navy onboard the Sloop of War Congress, tending the sick and wounded until his death. Nathaniel was a veteran of the American Army of the Revolution and the War of 1812. His family received the news that he had died of wounds in battle and mourned his loss bitterly. Imagine the rejoicing when he arrived home well and alive.

GRANDCHILDREN...Monumental Church in Richmond, Virginia, was built to commemorate 72 people who were lost in a December 26th, 1811, theater fire, considered one of the nation's first major disasters. Among those who perished were family members of Gov. Smith and Chief Justice John Marshall, and Dr. Hunter's granddaughter Arianna Hunter. Great-grandson Alexander Hunter (1843-1914) was a member of the Virginia Legislature in 1879, and wrote books on history and nature, many of which are digitized on Open Library. Granddaughter Emily Hunter married Col. William Selden who was the Treasurer of the United States under five Presidents, from 1839-1850.

ABINGDON...One of this family's best stories centers on a piece of land called Abingdon first owned by John Alexander and later John Parke Custis. In 1835, Gen. Alexander Hunter, the grandson of Dr. John Hunter, purchased 99 acres of the original plantation on the Potomac near present-day Arlington. Upon this land was situated a mansion where Hunter hoped to raise a family. He poured his considerable wealth into the beautiful grounds and mansion. There were no children to bless his marriage, but family records say there was never a dull moment. At any given time, he fostered nine or more indigent children. Upon his death in 1849, he left Abingdon to his brother Bushrod Washington Hunter in trust for Bushrod's son, his namesake, Alexander. The Civil War loomed, and Bushrod Hunter answered the call of the Confederacy. Taxes came due, and a family member attempted to pay in his absence. Wartime regulations demanded that taxes be paid by the owner in person, so tax agents refused the payment and the land and home were confiscated. Used during the War by Union forces, the gardens were wasted, the house worn but standing. Nephew Alexander Hunter reacquired the land in a lawsuit against the Government after the war, but it was never returned to its pre-war beauty. Alexander speaks lovingly of its "beautiful trees, fine orchards, its terraced lawns, and graveled walks leading to the river" in his book Johnny Reb and Billy Yank¹. It was eventually sold and finally burned down in 1930. A plaque at National Airport recognizes the historic importance of the mansion where Presidents Andrew Jackson took refuge on weekends.

Delving into the roots of a family is a tough job. The roots are tangled. First names are handed down to subsequent generations. Dates and records are lost, and only the memories of family members in later generations are left to piece together a clouded past. The reward is finding that the legacy parallels history. First and foremost is the character that shapes the individual and influences those around him. I saw honesty, strength, faith, courage, kindness, service, and finishing good things—staying the course. The Hunter families of Alexandria indeed made their impression on history!

VICTORY FOR A SCOTS LAWYER PULLED UP ON HIS PRONUNCIATION

Sir, The idiosyncrasies of the English language do allow the non-native speaker the occasional victory, too. The great 19th century Scots lawyer, John Clerk,

THREE COUSINS, THIRTY YEARS, AND THE HUNTERSTON CASTLE

n the 1980s, three of my cousins, Sharon, Lynn and Mary Jo, who were born and raised in West Virginia, traveled to Scotland and toured Hunterston Castle, all separately. They had migrated from West Virginia to Texas and California. I had heard of their great tours of the castle all these years and been given a small rustically-framed photo of the lane leading to the castle. Early in 2013, my Texas cousin, Mary Jo Nelson, and I talked often, long distance, about my planned visit in the fall of 2013 to Hunterston Castle in Scotland. Mary Jo sent me an old booklet about the castle. She also sent a copy of a letter dated 24 November 1982 from "Hunter of Hunterston". In the letter, he stated, "I find...a most interesting note which you wrote in the castle visitor's book, telling me that you know your family tree from Francis, second son of Robert Hunter, my ancestor."

In July of 2013, trying to schedule a castle tour, I sent an email to the castle website and got а wonderful reply from Madam Pauline Hunter, Clan Chief. One statement from her deeply touched my heart and spirit. She said, "Thank you for your request to have a tour of your spiritual Hunterston home, Castle...May I wish you Jackie Murray in Hunterston Castle a wonderful visit to see your heritage and roots."

Later, I received an email from Pauline Fraser, the castle tour guide, and we scheduled the tour for my husband, Rev. Vernon Murray, and me for Thursday, September 5, 2013, at 1:00 PM. I wore my Hunter Clan tartan scarf, and Vernon wore his Murray tartan scarf.

We excitedly approached the castle and while slowly pulling into our parking place, we saw a lady with a most unusual cat. It was a hairless sphinx cat. I thought to myself, "Is this cat supposed to guard the castle like the sphinx guarding the pyramids?" The cat belonged to a lady who rents a small cottage apartment behind the castle.

Pauline Fraser gave us a most interesting tour and at the conclusion, gave us a signed, numbered print of

J. Makie's springtime painting of Hunterston Castle. The artist and Madam Pauline had both signed the print. I had the print matted and framed professionally, so it will be a family heirloom for my Hunter descendants. After touring the castle, Vernon and I walked around the walled garden next to the castle. We enjoyed the lovely flowers, and in the corner of one wall, read a memorial stone listing 14 Hunterston family pets. The stone was engraved with names and breeds of dogs, including Jock-Aberdeen-1907, Prince-Terrier-1919, Jock-Collie-1903, and Peter-Corgi-1950, among others.

We stayed at South Whittlieburn Farm, a B&B on a working sheep farm. Mary Watson, our hostess, greeted us each morning with a sumptuous Scottish breakfast. Mmmmm so good! I asked Mr. Watson if he would be willing to have Tess, his Border Collie, give us a sheep herding demonstration in the field, which was also occupied by several horses and ponies. We watched and video recorded this magnificent, beautiful, welltrained Tess herd sheep all over the field in front of us. Mr. Watson whistled and called out all his commands, followed obediently and intently by Tess.

The town of Largs, near Hunterston Castle, hosted a Viking festival during our stay. The town park, along the water's edge, had a medieval Scottish village next to a medieval Viking village. We toured each village, chatted with costumed re-enactors, and saw food cooking, fiber spinning, and clothing and weapons being made. While talking with the Viking warriors in the village, we learned they were expecting a group of Viking re-enactors from North Carolina, USA, to join them the next day! Sadly we had to leave Scotland before the annual 1263 battle re-enactment.

My cousin, Sharon from California, lost her sister, Lynn, unexpectedly July 15, 2013. We were all shocked! Lynn had loved her visit to Hunterston, and was a member of Clan Hunter USA. Then on August 3, 2013, I got a call that my cousin, Mary Jo, in Texas, had died in her sleep, also totally unexpectedly. Mary Jo was the beloved, vivacious center of her large family, including her husband, Harry, three children, and many grandkids.

My visit to Scotland was bittersweet. I was blessed to follow in my three cousins' footsteps to Hunterston. I count them as dear, special descendants of our Hunters of Scotland. Sharon and I miss her sister, Lynn, and our cousin, Mary Jo. My visit to Hunterston and this article are to honor Lynn and Mary Jo, beloved cousins and Hunter descendants.
