

A SCOTTISH BOOK REVIEW

THE KNIFE MAN

The extraordinary Life and Times of John Hunter, Father of Modern Surgery by Wendy Moore

This marvelous account of the life of Dr. John Hunter, born at Long Calderwood, West Kilbride, Scotland in 1728, enlightened me immensely! I had heard snippets of his productive endeavors, but learned much more in Ms. Moore's biography. It is obvious that she "did her homework", as she includes many personal testimonies from Hunter's contemporaries as well as quotes from the man himself. His brother, Dr. William Hunter, father of modern gynecology, is quoted in the book too. Interestingly one of the men credited with helping with her research is Alastair Hunter, academic manager of the dissecting rooms of Guy's, King's, and St. Thomas' School of Biomedical Sciences, London. Though the author doesn't make a connection with Dr. John's family, I still consider the mention noteworthy.



One of the most interesting tales I remember hearing is that of Hunter acquiring the body of an Irish giant. Moore gives a rather revealing account of this event from before the giant died (at age 22) to three years after his demise when the huge skeleton was displayed to the public in John Hunter's amazing and extensive collection of specimens for the first time. He had an extension between two back-to-back houses in London constructed to house his orderly display of more than 14,000 displays, including Charles Byrne's skeleton. It is still on display at The Hunterian Museum in London!

Dr. John Hunter was instrumental in uncovering many mysteries involving the human body as well as animal bodies and plants. His interests were many, and he used his 20 wakeful hours during each day to the fullest dissecting, observing, recording, and teaching more than 1,000 future surgeons. His notes were meticulous and extensive. You'll learn in this book what happened to those notes after his death. Though he had many devotees, he had as many enemies who were not above undermining his efforts whenever possible. One of those was his very own brother-in-law, John Home! Dr. Hunter's contributions to the field of medicine and dentistry are innumerable. He and his brother William are

considered to be two of the five most important doctors to have ever lived.

I do, as a Christian, take issue with one facet of his thinking. He determined that evolution was the method by which the earth and all its inhabitants came to us. His rejection of the Biblical view of creation as well as Christian thought as to the age of the earth was disturbing for me to learn. I do laud his work ethic, his brilliant mind, and his dogged determine to learn all he could about the working of the human body in particular. But I do decry his humanistic views.

There is a very helpful timeline at the back of the book with Dr. Hunter's life events and important world events alongside. Ms. Moore's biography of the brilliant John Hunter is a must read for all Hunters, especially the numerous physician members (and future doctors) of Clan Hunter! The book is readily available on Amazon and Ebay for just a few dollars to as much as \$400.

GRANDFATHER MOUNTAIN HIGHLAND GAMES

The 62nd Grandfather Mountain Highland Games and Gathering of Scottish Clans was celebrated in the beautiful mountains of western North Carolina, just north of Linville, July 6 - 9, 2017. Hosting the Clan Hunter tent at MacRae Meadows this year for the 4-day event included Greg Slaton of Atlanta, Georgia, John Hunter from Pacific, Missouri, and Jill and Scott Powell from Mount Pleasant, South Carolina. A special thanks to all who helped greet members and guests over the weekend at the Clan Hunter tent.

The Highland games began Thursday, July 6, with activities for children, sheep dog demonstrations, Celtic entertainment and the running of The Bear. The Honored Guest for the 2017 Grandfather Mountain Highland Games was Granville Charles Gomer Gordon, Marquis of Huntly. A very gracious guest of honor, Clan Chief Gordon commented how much of a privilege it was for

The opening ceremonies began at dusk with a torchlight ceremony where representatives of all participating clans are invited to announce participation of their family in the gathering. Prior to the torchlight ceremony, several hundred runners participated in a 5-mile footrace call "The Bear" that climbs 1568 feet in elevation from the town of Linville to the summit of Grandfather Mountain.

Friday through Sunday, thousands of guests enjoyed a taste of our Scottish heritage through music concerts, food, athletic and musical competitions and dance. Adjacent to the parade ground, on MacRae Meadows, were merchants selling Gaelic and tartan gift items, and booths that were filled with offerings of meat pies and sweets to give guests a taste of the Highlands. A tent was available to help guests trace their Scottish roots and explore their heritage.

For the third consecutive year, the games offered the Scottish Cultural Village. This Village featured a close-up look to many facets of Scottish culture. Every 30 minutes, on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, invited experts from Scotland and the United States were on the Village's Center Stage to discuss or demonstrate skills such as blacksmithing, weaving, spinning, athletics, piping & drumming and dancing. Discussions and lectures were also presented on aspects of Scottish life such as edged weaponry, period firearms, men's and women's ancient dress, clan life & politics. There was a topic for everyone! Friday evening, beginning at 6:30 pm, several musical

groups including Rathkeltair and Seven Nations played Celtic rock and roll selections for interested ticket holders. Saturday evening was just as enjoyable, ending the evening with a spontaneous unscheduled jam session at MacRae Meadows.

Scottish families and guests enjoyed the spectacular North Carolina Blue Ridge Mountains that are so reminiscent of Scotland. As it has been said before, The Grandfather Games are considered America's grandest Games because of the spectacular mountain setting that is so reminiscent of Scotland. M. Hunter Smith, MD, the first recipient of The Order of the Royal Huntsman, was born on 7 May 1919, in Lafayette, Indiana, and died suddenly on 13 March 2017 in Atlantic Beach, Florida. Serving as past president of Clan Hunter USA as well as on its board of directors, Smith was an integral part of the clan organization. We owe him a debt of gratitude!

He was a graduate of Purdue University and Indiana University School of Medicine. He practiced medicine in Indiana, California, Illinois, and Maryland. He served as a Medical Missionary in Nigeria for six years.

Dr. Smith is survived by his wife, Bonnie S. Smith and children, Marsha Hunter Smith, Andrea S. Kennedy, Gregg L. Smith, and Michelle S. Hyson, seven grandchildren and six great-grandchildren. Family members carry on his legacy by being a part of CHUSA.

Long-time Clan Hunter USA member, **Dr. Nadine Hunter** died in September of 2016 at the age of 98. Surrounded by 5 of her 9 children, she quietly slipped away in her own home in Dansville, NY. She was predeceased by her husband 51 years prior and a son only 3 months before her passing.

Dr. Nadine will be sorely missed by her entire family as well as a host of friends. Those of us in Clan Hunter USA will remember her contributions too!

Lee (Buddy) Owen Hunter (1928-2016) of Clarksville, TN, passed away peacefully in his sleep on December 5, 2016. He graduated from Sewanee Military Academy and was an electrical engineer. Mr. Hunter served in the U.S. Army. He will be missed by all who knew and loved him.

Two Tattoos: Hunterston and Edinburgh Castles

The Hunter Clan gathering at Hunterston Castle in late July, 2017, was a rousing success thanks to the hard work of Madam Pauline, Clan Chief, and many helpers. This was our second Gathering for Jan and Ric Hunter from western North Carolina, but it was the first for cousin Louie Hunter and his lady, Michelle Brown from Atlanta. We got our courage up, rented a car, & struck out on the wrong side of the road (for US drivers) to Largs and a wonderful B & B on a working sheep farm in the country.

The Gathering for three days was replete with Hunters from all over the world, including Mexico, South Africa, the Netherlands and other countries. There were pipers from the Isle of Cumbrae Pipe Band, archery with long bows, great food, tours of the castle and guest speakers in Lord Lyon, the keeper of all things Scottish, and a great story teller giving us the history of Hunterston through the eyes of Wee Archie "The Hunter Time Forgot."

The clan crest personal tattoo had become more popular since the last Gathering we attended in 2012. Al Hunter and his two college age grandsons proudly showed their brand spanking new inked deltoids. The unquestioned pentacle of the trip was the other tattoo--the Edinburgh

Military Tattoo a week later. For the first time in the 35-year history of the Tattoo, clans were asked to participate and the Hunters had the largest numbers as we marched into the castle's Esplanade. Jacobite reenactors outfitted in 18th century battle dress escorted our three clans as 9000 people cheered and millions watched on television. We were treated to a 75-minute show of 1200 participants on the field including hundreds of pipers, military bands from Japan and India with dancers galore. So, we had the trip of our lives, and Al Hunter brought his tattoo from Hunterston to the Edinburgh Tattoo for "Two Tattoos!"

The Darien Colony

1200 emigrants left the port of Leith (Edinburgh) in 1608 on 5 ships to cross the Atlantic Ocean to establish a new Scottish Colony in Panama, Central America. The emigrants didn't know at first where they were bound, but they left with enthusiasm anyway. This venture was financed by William Paterson, a young wealthy banker. Many enthusiastic Scots contributed to the attempt when England refused to help fund it. Paterson, his wife, and son were the first passengers aboard.

The aim of the backers was to compete with The East India Company in transporting goods across the isthmus of Panama from the Pacific Ocean to avoid having to sail around Cape Horn. The new colony was called Caledonia where hopefully a settlement called New Edinburgh would flourish. If successful, the enterprise would make Scotland one of the richest countries in the world.

Sadly, several factors contributed to doom the colony. There was infighting from the beginning, they were short of food, they suffered from tropical diseases, and the English colonies in North America and the West Indies were forbidden to help them. A ship laden with supplies from the Clyde never arrived.

Sick, disheartened, and dying, the survivors decided to return home less than a year later. Only one ship actually arrived back in Scotland. Unbeknownst to them another group of potential settlers crossed their path on its way to Panama. That ship, laden with supplies, wasn't allowed by the controlling Spanish into the harbor.

The enterprise was scuttled in March, 1700 while a lone piper played a lament. In 1979 traces of the doomed settlement were discovered in what is still called Caledonia Bay.
